
Dear Friends,

Whew, what a year! We welcomed our new Bishop, Michael Duca, concluded a long-term recovery program implemented in the aftermath of the floods of 2016, maintained our refugee resettlement program despite drastic reductions in arrivals, adopted new bylaws, were recognized by the American Immigration Lawyers Association as the non-profit of the year in our region, launched a new corporation to provide alternatives to pay-day loans ... and served 33,000 people total through all of our programs combined.

But the work of our agency is larger than these numbers alone and more meaningful than singular accomplishments. It takes place within the mystery of the Body of Christ, made possible through the guidance of our Catholic mission and support of our Catholic community. Our Mission Statement reminds us that ours is a call to service; our Gospel proclamation is our *action*. And we are only able to take action because of the steadfast, unwavering commitment of our Catholic Church, built on a tradition directly rooted in the life of Christ and passed on through the people we are blessed to serve and work with.

Among them, we are particularly thankful for Bishop Robert W. Muench, who retired this past year. His belief in the importance of our work provided solid footing for us to confidently take steps – indeed giant leaps – when faced with new challenges and called to respond to people in need. We are thankful for his leadership and the support we enjoy throughout our community, all of which combine to enable us to share with you the stories of success highlighted in this report.

Providing Help and Encouragement During Crisis

153 families in danger of homelessness received financial assistance for housing, utilities and other basics.

Special assistance for housing and utilities was re-established in Tangipahoa Parish.

117 people found strength through mental health counseling at 7 locations, some from our Spanish-speaking counselors.

Of the 68 people, most chronically unemployed, who found jobs, 90% were still employed 9 months later.

In a new partnership with hospitals, 100 new mothers received Baby Love bags filled with 3-weeks of baby care items for their newborns.



Creating Hope for a Brighter Tomorrow

12 families moved into Families First on Evangeline for counseling, budgeting help, employment services and tutoring.

60 attended a six-week course for first time homebuyers.

430 people learned to manage their money, and 4 months later, were utilizing good financial habits.

39 parents living in Pointe Coupee helped prepare their children for school through HIPPPY—Home Instruction for the Parents of Preschool Youngsters.



Welcoming Immigrants and Refugees Seeking Freedom

65 refugees fled violence and persecution from Afghanistan, Congo DRC, Cuba, Eritrea, Honduras, Iran, Iraq, Syria, Venezuela and resettled in Baton Rouge.

162 immigrants sought legal advice, counsel and orientation from the area's only nonprofit immigration attorneys.

1,288 guardian sponsors of unaccompanied minors were counseled as to their rights and responsibilities and screened for fitness to care for the children fleeing violence in Central America.

30 people were served on Naturalization Day and 11 became citizens.

We established an Immigration Law Clinic through a grant from the Kellogg Foundation



Strengthening Families through Service

150 volunteers and interns donated 6,000 hours of service.

176 special needs children received individual classroom help from 96 Foster Grandparents at in East Baton Rouge and Pointe Coupee schools.

Agency staff and volunteers prepared a record-setting 1,578 tax returns for low-income families and individuals—their refunds totaled almost \$1.5M.

250 children received new school shoes thanks to Catholic Church parishioners, and Payless Shoes.

450 families and seniors experienced the Joy of Christmas because of generous donors and volunteers.

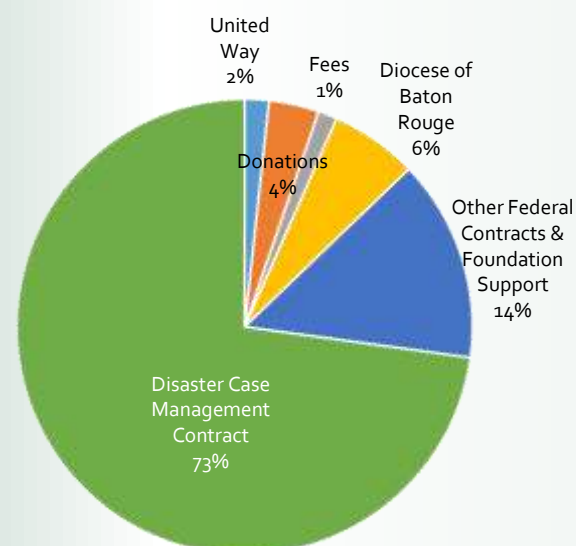

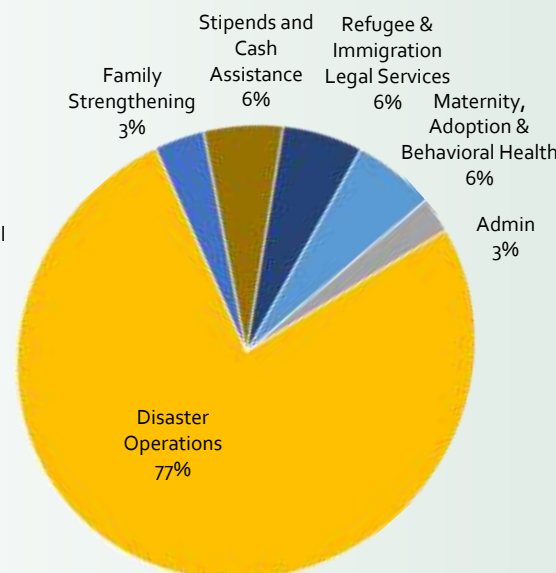

Protecting Life and Building Families through Adoption

10 infants and children were placed in loving adoptive homes.

52 pregnant women and teens found guidance to choose life for their unborn children.

3 teen and adult adoptees, birth parents and adoptive parents were counseled.

6 babies were born to mothers living at Sanctuary for Life— our housing ministry for homeless, pregnant women.

Donated diapers, portable cribs, and other baby care items were provided for 212 babies.



Focusing on Criminal Justice Reform and Life after Prison

42 homeless, male ex-offenders found a new start at Joseph Homes.

School children gained a better understanding about life behind bars and donated over 20,000 Christmas cards for inmates in our Diocese.

In partnership with the Louisiana Parole Project, Joseph Homes now offers short-term transitional housing to recently released juvenile lifers paroled after serving at least 30 years.

Job developers, funded by the Wilson Foundation, connected Joseph Homes clients with felony-friendly employers.



Supporting Communities Recovering after Disaster

5,500 families enrolled in Disaster Case Management to recover from damages caused by the storms of 2016.

Case managers worked with 11 different parish long term recovery committees to tap into donations of household goods and repair money to help families move back into their homes.

Catholic Charities USA granted the agency \$3.25M to fund repairs and provide behavioral health services. Some funds are earmarked for immigrants who have no where else to turn to for help.

Disaster behavioral health was provided to 150 survivors.



Raising a Joyful Voice for a Better Society

Advocacy volunteers and staff worked with the Louisiana Conference of Catholic Bishops on human rights legislation from death penalty abolition and criminal justice reform to ethical adoption practices, poverty alleviation, and immigration rights.

Catholic school students strengthened their faith through volunteering, donating household goods and participating in Operation Rice Bowl.

The Faith Fund was launched to fight the plague of payday loans, a new initiative made possible by the Campaign for Human Development.
