

Feeding the Hungry

On one Saturday every month, students from around the community, including St. Joseph's Academy (SJA) in Baton Rouge gather to give back to their community in a meaningful way. They break down pallets of food and pack 30-pound boxes to help those in need. It's a program designed to assist the food insecure in the area, and its impact has been profound.

Claire Bergeron, a senior at SJA, has made it a point to volunteer almost every Saturday since the program first began. For her, it's more than just an event—it's a calling. With each Saturday spent working side by side with fellow students, Claire finds herself not only physically helping but emotionally moved by the experience.

When asked why she keeps coming back, her answer was simple yet powerful: "I feel inspired to help people. It's rewarding to see all the work you've done at the end. It's a lot of work, but it's definitely worth it." Every box packed and every pallet broken down reminds Claire of the bigger picture: the difference one Saturday at a time can make in the lives of so many.

After thoughtful consideration, the birth mother chose to continue with the adoption plan. Against all odds, the baby defied expectations and is now improving. The infant is surrounded by the love of both the birth parents and the adoptive parents, a reflection of the strong bond and hope that guided everyone through the journey.

The organization is committed to openness in adoption, ensuring that every person involved—the birth parents, the adopted child, and the adoptive family—feels supported and valued. Services + Programs

REFUGEE & IMMIGRATION SERVICES

ASPIRE & Trafficking Victim
Assistance Program (TVAP) help
trafficking survivors with basic needs
such as food, clothing, health
services, and transportation.

Employment Services provides job training, locating employment opportunities, and follow-up services.

Immigration Legal Services assists refugees, immigrants, and victims of human trafficking to rebuild their lives by providing legal services, fingerprinting, case management, and translation services to access services, gain employment, and become productive members of our community.

LOUISIANA OFFICE FOR REFUGEES

Louisiana Office for Refugees is designated by the Federal government to coordinate refugee resettlement and promote refugee self-sufficiency and community integration in Louisiana through grants management, policy guidance, and program development.

Refugee Services resettles refugee families fleeing violence and persecution in their homeland. Services provided include language training, social and medical services, counseling, job placement, family reunification, and citizenship preparation for immigrants and refugees.

FAMILY SERVICES

Foster Grandparents stationed at schools in East Baton Rouge and Pointe Coupee parishes help at-risk children learn to read, provide one-on-one tutoring, and guide children at a critical time in their lives.

Adoption Services places children with their forever families. The program is Hague accredited and licensed for domestic and international adoptions. Search and reunion and counseling services for those whose lives have been touched by adoption.

Maternity Services offers free, confidential counseling for parents experiencing an unplanned pregnancy regardless of their decision to parent or make an adoption plan.

Parents and Children Together (PACT) home visitors work with parents of children 0–5 to improve education and family well-being.

DISASTER OPERATIONS

Disaster Operations helps churches and the community prepare for disaster. The program provides relief supplies and other assistance in the immediate aftermath of a disaster and long-term case management services to help families recover, including counseling, repairs, and referrals for services.

COMMUNITY SUPPORT

Families First Housing program offers 2- & 3-bedroom apartments at belowmarket fees for families with children along with case management.

Faith-Full Mobile Food Pantry provides food to low-income individuals throughout the Diocese of Baton Rouge.

Homelessness Prevention assists families in crisis to develop a recovery plan and offers community referrals and limited financial assistance for rent and utilities.

Joseph Homes provides transitional housing to formerly incarcerated males with access to job-finding and medical case management.

Sanctuary for Life (SFL) houses pregnant women over 18 in need of medical care, job services, nutritious meals, and case management. St. Patrick's House provides transitional housing for successful SFL graduates and their newborns.

Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) volunteers provide free basic income tax return preparation with electronic filing to qualified individuals.
